Accidents and disasters - everything from airplane and train crashes to earthquakes, tornadoes and tsunamis - are some of the hardest stories to cover. Reporters on the ground have to gather information in very difficult circumstances and make stories with very tight deadlines. Covering such an event requires the full training and experience of a reporter. But if you keep in mind the lessons you've learned and the skills you've acquired, covering an accident or a disaster can be a chance to really test yourself as a reporter and give some of your best work. So here are 10 tips to keep in mind. Disasters are stressful situations. After all, a disaster means something terrible has happened on a very large scale. Many people at the scene, especially victims, will be distraught. It's a reporter's job in a situation like this to keep a calm, clear head. Reporters dealing with disasters often have to bring in a lot of new information very quickly. For example, you may not know much about airplanes, but if you are suddenly asked to help cover the plane crash, you will have to learn as much as you can - quickly. You have to take detailed notes off everything you learn, including things that seem insignificant. You never know when small details can become critical to your story. Readers want to know what the scene of the disaster looked like, it sounded like it smelled. Get the sights, sounds and smells of your notes. Think of yourself as a camera, recording all the visual details you can. In the aftermath of the disaster, there will usually be dozens of emergency responders on the scene - firefighters, police, paramedics and so on. Find the person in charge of the emergency response service. This official will have a great picture of what is happening and will be a valuable resource. The information from the emergency authorities is great, but you also need to get quotes from people who have seen what happened. Eyewitness accounts are invaluable to a disaster story. It is not always possible to interview survivors of a disaster immediately after the event. They are often treated by paramedics or questioned by detectives. But if survivors are available, try your best to interview them. But remember, the survivors of the disaster survived a traumatic event. Be considerate and sensitive to your questions and general approach. And if they say they don't want to talk, respect their wishes. In almost every disaster, heroes appear - people who bravely and selflessly threaten their own safety to help others. Interview them. Disaster stories are often about numbers - how many people were killed or injured, how much property was destroyed, how fast the plane was moving, etc. Remember to collect these but only from reliable sources - the officials responsible for the site. When reporting, remember what's most important about any news story - who, what, where, when, why, and how. Keeping these elements in mind will help you to all the information needed for the story. Accident report screens are used to document injuries to employees and customers in the workplace. It often serves as protection for an individual or business if someone is directly responsible for a work site accident. Here's how to fill out the accident report form correctly. Get the name of the person who was involved in the accident. They'll probably have to sign the accident report. The accident report forms document what happened and how the individual was injured. Enter as many details as you can recall from the accident. The accident report shall record the date and time of the injury. Also give me the names of the people who were present at the crash site. State accident code When to report an accident You must immediately notify the nearest law enforcement agency, if: Any person injured or killed, property damage in excess of \$50 The accident occurred in a city that requires all reported accidents The insurance company requires you 20 days to file an owner/driver accident report if: Each person injured or killed in Property Damage exceeds \$400 Crash Reporting Filing Note: Laws may change, so it's important to check the information you've read by carrying out your own research or consulting with a Tennessee attorney. Tennessee car accident reporting laws technically, Tennessee law does not require you to report all accidents. However, the state has created such a low property damage threshold that virtually every accident must report in some form. For example, if there is an accident on a motorway or on site any shopping center, caravan park, apartment complex, or any other place visited by the public - and \$50 or more in property damage results - - reported immediately to local law enforcement. The easiest way to report an accident is to dial 911. The officer who arrives at the scene is preparing a report on the accident. When you need to file a personnel casualty report in Tennessee Tennessee there is an additional reporting requirement if the accident results in \$400 or more in property damage, or death or physical injuries. In these situations, all drivers or owners of vehicles involved in the accident must submit a report to the Tennessee Department of Safety within 20 days. It is worth noting that personal identification data submitted in the motor vehicle accident report are considered confidential by the State and are not available to the public. However, reports of vehicle accidents are available to parties listed in the report as being involved. The report is necessary regardless of who was to blame and in addition to all reports submitted by the investigating officer. The purpose of this report is to ensure that all drivers are insured in accordance with state law. If a personal accident report is not filed with the Department of Safety, it may result in the suspension of driving licences and registration of persons involved in the accident or non-resident operating rights. How to submit an accident report to Tennessee Each driver or vehicle owner involved in an accident must submit a department official accident report form. The form only asks for information on the driver, the owner of the vehicle and the insurance of the vehicle. You do not need any information about the rest involved in the accident. A copy of the report will be forwarded to the insurance company. The completed form must be sent by post to P.O. Box 945 Nashville, TN 37202. Submitting a car accident report? The key is to make sure that the information in the report is accurate before an inaccuracy becomes a problem and perhaps costs money. So, what exactly is the information about the police car accident? The basic information is quite obvious and should always be part of every report, be. Make sure the following information is included and complete: The date and location of the crash. Details are important. Important, date should include, of course, the day, month and year, but also the specific time. It wouldn't hurt to record the day of the week. As for the place, be very specific. Make sure everything that applies includes: county; city or city; road, street, route and/or intersection; road signs; railway crossing identification; and all distinctive landmarks. The report shall also describe the weather conditions at the time of the accident. Drivers and vehicles. Make sure that the report includes all the information about each driver, including name, address, phone number, driver's license number, and date of birth. Pretty much all the information that you can find on your driver's license is what you should ask to take a look at, by the way. It is worth noting if another driver's license indicates a corrective glasses requirement, especially if the other driver does not appear to have been wearing glasses at the time of the accident. It is also important that the report contains full information on all the vehicles involved, such as the year, make and model, as well as the registration plate. Passengers and other witnesses. Here's where you need to check the information in the police report written by the responding officer to make sure it is complete. In many cases, officers do not take down basic information about passengers unless they are injured or killed. But passengers are often the best witnesses to an accident. So if you fill out the report at the station or the DMV, be sure to include all the information you have on your passengers. In addition, make sure the police report took the statements of all third-party witnesses. Third-party witnesses are often seen as particularly credible because they have no obvious relationship with the parties and therefore have no bias. Carefully insist that the responding officer take down the information and statements of witnesses. If he doesn't, get the information yourself. It might come in handy later. It should be noted here that the vast majority of police accident reports are made on printed forms where there is specific information and, in many cases, by ticking the check box to cover every possible small detail of what happened. It also allows the officer to write any further details that he considers important. If you're the one filling out the form at the police station or DMV, make sure you describe the accident in as much detail as the form allows, and then some. This is the most important part for you because that's where you get to tell your part of the story. If the report is prepared by a responding official, be sure to read what it writes to you and confirm its accuracy on the spot. You may want to review what the other parties and witnesses have put down in their statements if they get the opportunity. Remember that you need a police accident report, complete and accurate is difficult to exaggerate. This is not just for the insurance claim, but also as evidence in a civil or criminal court action. If you review the police accident report and discover an error, let them know immediately.
